Making Lemonade 2.0 is a three-day conference that addresses how culture and arts can contribute to more sustainability. In the face of climate crisis, the conference brings together artists and persons engaged in the cultural sector from Korea, France and Germany to exchange ideas, insights and reflections on how to create a more sustainable future.

Making Lemonade 2.0 aims to contribute to the conversation on the role that culture can play in this process. As a sustainable future will also depend on impactful new ideas and solutions, artists and creatives can provide their innovative and creative thinking, as well as add new technologies to the process. Culture can furthermore contribute to raise awareness and to open up spaces for discussion and reflection. Cultural institutions can support these activities by reviewing their own processes. The conference will also look at the impact that digital tools may or may not have on a sustainable artistic and cultural practices.

This conference will present **four conversations, artist performances and presentations by 25 participants** from Korea, France and Germany amongst them Bang & Lee, Rimini Protokoll, Festival d'Avignon, Tongyeong Triennale, Seoul Performing Arts Festival, etc. (see full program below). It is **open to a broad public** interested in the issues of the arts and culture, sustainability, and technology. **Making Lemonade 2.0** is co-organized by the Cultural Service of the Embassy of France in Korea, the Goethe-Institut Korea, Art Center Nabi and Arts Council Korea – ARKO and supported by the Franco-German Cultural Fund.

The title "Making Lemonade" is inspired by the English expression "**When life gives you lemons, make lemonade!**", in other words, "if life gives you hardships, turn them into opportunities".

Making Lemonade 2.0: Towards a Sustainable Future for the Arts is the second edition of the festival, and the continuation of Making Lemonade: Towards a Digital Future for the Arts which was held online from April 14 to April 16, 2021. It looked at the challenges of arts and culture in an online and digital environment during the pandemic and gathered almost **4.500 online participants**.

Franco-German Cultural Fund



The Franco-German Cultural Fund was created on 22nd January 2003, on the occasion of the 40th anniversary of the Elysée Treaty, sealing the friendship between France and Germany. It allows both countries to encourage and support cooperation initiatives conducted jointly by the French and German diplomatic networks in a third country. This program demonstrates France and Germany's shared desire to strengthen their cooperation in the cultural field, but also and above all to affirm their commitment to European integration.
