I. YOU ARE A STUDENT IN KOREA (HIGH-SCHOOL, BACHELOR, MASTER) OR A PHD CANDIDATE

FRENCH GOVERNEMENT - FRANCE EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIP

The France Excellence program supports international students who wish to pursue higher education in France. Managed by Campus France, the program provides guidance and financial assistance to students applying for master's and PhD programs at French institutions. Its goal is to promote French higher education internationally while fostering the academic and professional growth of students, enhancing their opportunities to study in France. Candidates are selected based on academic excellence and alignment with French institutions. Financial support includes a round-trip airfare between the Republic of Korea and France, social security coverage, and a monthly stipend.

FRENCH GOVERNMENT - EIFFEL SCHOLARSHIP

The Eiffel Excellence Scholarship Program, established by the French Ministry for Europe and Foreign Affairs, aims to support French higher education institutions in enrolling international students in their master's and PhD programs. Students must select a French institution based on their field of study, and the institution will then submit the scholarship application on behalf of the student.

ASEM-DUO - FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

Fields of Study: All disciplines

This program is designed for partner Korean and European universities that have already established an academic exchange agreement. The Korean university selects a student to send to the partner European institution, and the European institution selects a student to send to the Korean university. The program is open to undergraduate and master's level students. The European student's institution must have an exchange agreement with a Korean university, and there must be a Korean student interested in studying at the European institution. Students apply for the scholarship as a pair. The total scholarship amount is €8,000 for both students, with each student receiving €4,000. The program has a duration of one semester or four months.

INRIA INTERNSHIP

The Inria internship program offers students and young researchers the opportunity to gain hands-on experience within its research teams. Open to undergraduates and postgraduate students, these internships provide exposure to cutting-edge digital science and innovation in a public research environment. Interns collaborate on research and development projects, benefiting from a stimulating work environment and expert mentorship. Internship durations typically range from one to six months, with conditions varying based on the level of study and type of internship.

CIFRE - GRANTS FOR PHD STUDENTS

CIFRE stands for "Industrial Agreement for Training through Research." It is designed for students who have completed a Master's degree and wish to pursue a PhD. Under this program, PhD students are both enrolled in a doctoral program at a French research laboratory and employed by a French company. The CIFRE grant allows students to dedicate their time to their research project, splitting their time between the company and the academic lab. The grant provides funding of up to $\leq 14,000$ per year for three years. Additionally, the company can benefit from the "*Crédit d'impôt recherche*". The program is open to students of all nationalities.

EUROPEAN UNION - ERASMUS+ INTERNATIONAL CREDIT MOBILITY (ICM)

Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility (ICM) facilitates exchanges between European universities and partner institutions in Korea, enabling students to study abroad while earning recognized credits. Mobility opportunities are based on bilateral agreements between institutions. Students can study in Korea for 3 to 12 months, with short-term doctoral mobility available for 5 to 30 days. Financial support includes a \notin 700 monthly allowance and a \notin 1,500 travel grant. As Erasmus+ ICM is not an open application program, students and staff must check with their home university for available partnerships and application procedures.

EUROPEAN UNION - ERASMUS MUNDUS JOINT MASTER DEGREES (EMJM)

Erasmus Mundus Joint Master Degrees (EMJMDs) offer scholarships to South Korean students to pursue a master's degree across multiple European universities. These competitive programs enable students to study in at least two European countries, as part of a consortium of institutions. The scholarships cover tuition fees, travel costs, and provide a living allowance. South Korean students can apply directly to individual EMJMD programs that align with their academic goals. As each program has its own eligibility criteria, deadlines, and application procedures, students should visit the respective program websites for detailed information.

EUROPEAN UNION – MARIE SKLODOWSKA-CURIE ACTIONS

The Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions (MSCA) offer funding for researchers to participate in high-impact research projects across Europe. MSCA programs, including Individual Fellowships (IF), Innovative Training Networks (ITN), and Research and Innovation Staff Exchanges (RISE), foster international collaboration and career development through training and knowledge exchange. Funding covers living allowances, mobility grants, and research costs, depending on the program. MSCA is open to researchers of all nationalities, with specific eligibility criteria for academic qualifications and experience.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL - YOUTH EXCHANGES

This exchange program offers high school students aged 15 to 19 the opportunity to immerse themselves in a new culture, learn a new language, and become true global citizens. Participants can choose from year-long stays, during which they continue their education abroad and live with multiple host families, or shorter stays ranging from a few days to three months, including camps, excursions, or homestays outside the school year. The program covers full-board accommodation and tuition fees.

II. YOU ARE A STUDENT IN FRANCE (HIGH-SCHOOL, BACHELOR, MASTER) OR A PHD CANDIDATE

KOREAN GOVERNMENT - GLOBAL KOREA SCHOLARSHIP (GKS) FOR GRADUATE DEGREES

The program is open to international students seeking to pursue master's or doctoral degree. All applicants must first complete a year of Korean language courses, unless they have already achieved TOPIK level 5. Each year, the government awards 1,080 scholarships for master's and doctoral programs. The call for applications opens in February for master's and doctoral programs, with selected candidates expected to arrive in Korea by August. Applicants must be under 40 years old and hold either a bachelor's or master's degree. Additionally, they must not have previously studied in Korea.

KOREAN UNIVERSITIES - SCHOLARSHIP

Many Korean universities offer scholarships for international students. In most cases, these scholarships are awarded based on academic excellence (GPA records) of the applicants. You are encouraged to check with your chosen university to learn about their specific selection criteria.

FRENCH REGIONAL COUNCILS AND DEPARTMENTS - INTERNATIONAL MOBILITY GRANT

French regional councils and departments frequently offer mobility grants to assist students who wish to study or intern abroad. For example, the Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes region provides the "*Bourse Région Mobilité Internationale Étudiants*," which covers expenses like travel and accommodation for international education or internships. To explore similar funding opportunities, students are encouraged to check with their local councils or departments.

EUROPEAN UNION - ERASMUS+ INTERNATIONAL CREDIT MOBILITY (ICM)

Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility (ICM) facilitates exchanges between European universities and partner institutions in Korea, enabling students to study abroad while earning recognized credits. Mobility opportunities are based on bilateral agreements between institutions. Students can study in Korea for 3 to 12 months, with short-term doctoral mobility available for 5 to 30 days. Financial support includes a ξ 700 monthly allowance and a ξ 1,500 travel grant. As Erasmus+ ICM is not an open application program, students and staff must check with their home university for available partnerships and application procedures.

This program is designed for partner Korean and European universities that have already established an academic exchange agreement. The Korean university selects a student to send to the partner European institution, and the European institution selects a student to send to the Korean university. FOUNDATION MARCEL BLEUSTEIN-BLANCHET DE LA VOCATION - SCHOLARSHIP

The Fondation Marcel Bleustein-Blanchet de la Vocation established a scholarship to support highly motivated young individuals in achieving the necessary education to pursue their chosen profession. The scholarship can be used to continue studies or undertake an internship abroad. The scholarship amount is \notin 8,000. This scholarship is open to young French individuals aged 18 to 30, who have demonstrated a clear vocational passion through tangible achievements but are facing significant financial difficulties in continuing their education.

KOREA FOUNDATION - GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

The Korea Foundation's Graduate Scholarships are intended for Master's or PhD students enrolled in a European institution, specializing in a topic related to Korea. Eligible fields include the humanities, arts, and culture. Around fifteen scholarships are awarded each year for a duration of one year. The scholarship amounts are ξ 9,000 for Master's students and ξ 15,000 for PhD students.

CNRS – NRF – JOINT FUNDINGS

As part of the bilateral exchange program involving eight partner countries, including France, the National Research Foundation (NRF) has proposed to the CNRS the opportunity to secure funding for International Research Networks (IRN) and International Research Projects (IRP) from the Korean side. French applicants for IRN or IRP must submit their application to the relevant CNRS department through their IRN or IRP and encourage their Korean partners to apply for funding from the NRF.

This program aims to facilitate exchange between French and Korean partners working on a joint project. The program funds up to 15 projects per year, which should involve active young researchers at a PhD or post-doc level, for a duration of one to two years. The annual call for projects covers all fields of research, including humanities and social sciences. Please note that the French team and the Korean team have to submit the same project to their own national institutions: Campus France or the NRF, to be eligible. Calls are launched annually around the end of February.

CNRS – INSERM - ATIP AVENIR

The CNRS and INSERM jointly coordinate the call ATIP Avenir, open to young researchers from all nationalities, allowing them to conduct a research project in France in the fields of life science and health for 5 years.

FMSP - DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR FELLOWSHIP

The Foundation *Sciences Mathématiques de Paris* offers financial support for external scientists (junior / senior) to be invited in its affiliated laboratories for a two-to-three months stay. Appointed scientists will also have the opportunity to visit and to work with members of external laboratories.

LE STUDIUM - VISITING RESEARCHER PROGRAM

This program provides highly qualified researchers, on leave from their home institution with salary maintenance or personal resources, the chance to join a laboratory in the Centre-Val de Loire region and the LE STUDIUM international scientific community for 3 to 12 months. It includes travel support, fully furnished housing, logistical and administrative assistance, specific training sessions, funding for organizing an international conference or workshop, and participation in the institute's activities and events.

INRIA – ASSOCIATE TEAMS

The Associate Teams program is a key initiative of Inria's international strategy, designed to foster long-term scientific collaborations between Inria research teams and international partners. Each Associate Team is a joint research project established for a period of three years, with a clearly defined scientific objective, collaboration plan, and exchange program. The program supports researcher mobility, including exchanges between France and the partner country, as well as the organization of joint workshops.

INRIA – INTERNATIONAL CHAIRS PROGRAM

The Inria International Chairs program offers experienced researchers the opportunity to collaborate with Inria teams during a 10 to 12-month stay, which can be spread over five years. This initiative aims to foster international partnerships and strengthen expertise in key research areas. Candidates must be based abroad and propose a research project aligned with an Inria host team. In addition to conducting research, chair holders engage in scientific dissemination activities. Inria provides a high-quality work environment and financial support. Applications require a detailed research plan, a work schedule, and endorsements from the host team and international experts.

EUROPEAN UNION - HORIZON EUROPE PILLAR II

Since January 2025, Korea has been associated with Pillar II of Horizon Europe, the EU's flagship framework program for research and innovation. Association is the closest form of international cooperation with the EU in the field of R&I, allowing non-EU countries to participate under conditions nearly identical to those of EU Member States. Under this framework, Korean researchers and organizations can take part in collaborative research projects on an equal footing with their European counterparts. They are eligible for co-funding from the National Research Foundation of Korea (NRF) for selected projects. Synergy grants are also available, where a group of 2-4 Principal Investigators (PIs) may include one PI outside the EU or countries associated to Horizon Europe, to tackle together an ambitious research problem, with all funded by the ERC.

FRENCH EMBASSY - STAR-T EXPLORATORY MISSION PROGRAM

The STAR-T Program allows scientists in all fields of sciences, including humanities and social sciences, working in a French research institution (R&D companies, universities or research bodies) to run a scientific mission in Korea to discover the Korean research landscape. The mission should involve meeting(s) and visit(s) with new Korean fellows to start new initiative that could leave to a scientific joint project.

NRF - KOREA RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP (KRF)

The Korea Research Fellowship (KRF), funded by the NRF, supports outstanding foreign researchers to conduct collaborative research in Korea. It provides postdoctoral funding for up to 5 years (3 years initially, with a possible 2-year extension) at Korean universities, research institutes, or corporate R&D centers.

NRF - BRAIN POOL (BP)

The Brain Pool Program, funded by the NRF, aims to attract outstanding foreign scientists to collaborate with Korean research institutions. It facilitates knowledge exchange, fosters international partnerships, and strengthens Korea's global research competitiveness. The program supports mid-career and senior researchers across all scientific fields, offering funding for 3 to 36 months. Financial support includes salary, relocation costs, and research expenses, with annual funding of up to KRW 150 million (€100,000) per researcher.

NRF - BRAIN POOL PLUS (BP+)

The Brain Pool Plus (BP+) Program, funded by the National Research Foundation of Korea (NRF), is an advanced version of the Brain Pool Program that targets top-tier international researchers for long-term collaboration with Korean institutions. This program strengthens Korea's global research capacity by bringing in experts to lead cutting-edge projects in various scientific fields. The program offers funding for 3 to 5 years, supporting senior-level researchers with exceptional expertise. Financial support includes salary, research expenses, and relocation costs, with funding of up to KRW 200 million ($\leq 135,000$) per year.

IBS - YOUNG SCIENTIST FELLOWSHIP (YSF)

The IBS Young Scientist Fellowship (YSF) invites talented young researchers to apply for postdoctoral positions at the Institute for Basic Science (IBS) in Korea. This program is designed to support outstanding international scientists under 40 years old who have completed their PhD within the last seven years. The fellowship offers a contract for 3 years, extendable for an additional 2 years.

IBS JUNIOR CHIEF INVESTIGATOR (CI)

The Junior Chief Investigator (Junior CI) program is designed to support ambitious and innovative research by early-career principal investigators (PIs) who have advanced beyond the Young Scientist Fellowship (YSF) level. It is open to young researchers eager to conduct independent and groundbreaking research in the field of basic science. Applicants must be able to dedicate themselves full-time to research within an IBS Research Center. The program offers a five-year contract.

Students apply for the scholarship as a pair. The total scholarship amount is ξ 8,000 for both students, with each student receiving ξ 4,000. The program has a duration of one semester or four months.

EUROPEAN UNION - ERASMUS+ INTERNATIONAL CREDIT MOBILITY (ICM)

Erasmus+ International Credit Mobility (ICM) facilitates exchanges between European universities and partner institutions in Korea, enabling students to study abroad while earning recognized credits. Mobility opportunities are based on bilateral agreements between institutions. Students can study in Korea for 3 to 12 months, with short-term doctoral mobility available for 5 to 30 days. Financial support includes a ξ 700 monthly allowance and a ξ 1,500 travel grant. As Erasmus+ ICM is not an open application program, students and staff must check with their home university for available partnerships and application procedures.

EUROPEAN UNION - ERASMUS MUNDUS JOINT MASTER'S DEGREES (EMJMDS) FOR ORGANISATIONS

Erasmus Mundus Joint master's degrees (EMJMDs) are integrated master's programs created by partnerships of higher education institutions (HEIs). Institutions from at least three different countries (including at least two EU Member States or associated third countries) collaborate to deliver the program. The EU funds both the operation of these programs and scholarships for top students globally. EMJMDs run for up to 6 academic years and involve 1 to 2 years of study (60, 90, or 120 ECTS credits), with students required to study in at least two countries. Institutions can apply on behalf of a partnership, and the program awards either a joint degree or multiple degrees.
